Here are some of our accomplishments for 2019:

The Department of Transportation (DOT) resurfaced the following streets:

- St. John's Place from Bedford to Ralph Avenues
- Utica Avenue from Atlantic Avenue to Eastern Parkway
- Hampton Place between Park and St. John's Places
- Flatbush Avenue from Atlantic to 7th Avenues
- Buffalo Avenue from Bergen Street to Eastern Parkway
- Lincoln Place from Schenectady Avenue to Eastern Parkway

Additionally, DOT approved the installation of a left-turn signal at Eastern Parkway northbound to New York Avenue and installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Sterling Place and Kingston Avenue.

The Parks Department celebrated the following accomplishments:

- St. John's Recreation Center re-opened at the start of summer with a new HVAC unit, new boilers, and new cooling system.
- Stroud Playground was renovated and reopened in May.

 Over 200 trees were pruned on various streets, in parks and playgrounds in District 8.

In 2019 the MTA NYC Transit began an accelerated ADA Accessibility and Elevator project at the 2/3 Eastern Parkway Brooklyn Museum subway station, and the project is scheduled to be completed this year.

Renovations and ADA Accessibility at the LIRR Nostrand Avenue Station will be completed by the end of this month.

The New York City Council approved and completed the street co-naming of the northwest corner of Pacific Street and Utica Avenue in honor of Reverend Timothy Wright.

The District office processed over 70 street activity permits last summer and fall.

The District office processed and helped resolve several hundred municipal complaints in the District.

Weeksville Heritage Center, a cultural gem in District 8, was designated as a Cultural Institutions Group by the New York City Council. Weeksville now joins three dozen other groups with such designations, all of whom receive grants to meet basic operating needs throughout the year.

January is Human Trafficking Awareness Month. Did you know there are more human slaves in the world today than ever before in history?

Human trafficking is believed to be one of the fastest-growing criminal industries in the world. Human trafficking involves the recruiting, harboring, transporting, providing, or obtaining of people for the purpose of various forms of exploitation. Victims are often controlled through force, fraud, or coercion. While it is commonly thought that human trafficking is the smuggling or

movement of people, the crime actually involves exploitation and control. Victims of human trafficking can be men or women, adults or children, and U.S. citizens or foreign-born immigrants.

Human trafficking can be difficult to recognize. Human trafficking victims may be forced to work as prostitutes, domestic workers, landscapers, in restaurants and bars, as forced panhandlers, in cleaning and janitorial jobs, in nail salons, or in other roles.

January is National Blood Donor Month. Blood is traditionally in short supply during the winter months due to the holidays, travel schedules, inclement weather and illness. January, in particular is a difficult month for blood centers to collect blood donations. A reduction in turnout can put our nation's blood inventory at a critical low level.

If you are at least 17 years of age, weigh at least 110 pounds and meet other donor requirements, you may be eligible to donate blood.

Representatives from the nation's blood banking community are challenging all eligible Americans who have yet to donate blood for the first time to make a New Year's resolution to give the "gift of life". Donate Blood!

January is also Glaucoma Awareness Month. Glaucoma is a group of eye diseases that have

common features including eye pressure too high for the health of the eye, damage to the optic nerve, and permanent loss of sight. The eye's drainage areas may become clogged or blocked so that too much fluid stays in the eye, which increases eye pressure. Too much pressure in the eye can damage the optic nerve, and if it is damaged, it becomes unable to send images to the brain, leading to blindness.

Everyone is at risk as glaucoma occurs in people of all ages and races. The most important risk factors include age, family history of glaucoma, African ancestry, and diabetes mellitus. Unfortunately, there are usually no symptoms to alert you that you have glaucoma. However, regular annual eye exams to check eye pressure can assist you with early diagnoses. Your eye doctor can perform exams to look at the optic nerve to see if there are signs of damage from glaucoma.

Treatment varies from person to person. Your doctor may prescribe eye drops or pills. Sometimes surgery is needed. There is no cure for glaucoma, but lifelong treatment usually controls glaucoma.

HELP STOP ILLEGAL DUMPING

NYC Dept. of Sanitation issues rewards to individuals that assist them in combating illegal dumping. It is unlawful for any person, their agent, employee or any person under his or her control to dispose of any material via personal vehicle on any street, lot, park, public place or other area whether publicly or privately owned. In instances where such dumping occurs, both owner and driver of the vehicle are liable for the dumping. Fines for the owner of the vehicle range from \$1,500 to \$20,000. In instances where the owner and the operator are different, the maximum fine can go up to \$40,000. In citizen complaint cases, a summons is generally issued to the registered owner of the reported vehicle.

To incentivize reports of illegal dumping, The Dept. of Sanitation offers a rewards program for individuals that report illegal dumping and the perpetrator is convicted and pays a fine, at the discretion of the Sanitation Commissioner, 50% of the amount collected shall be offered as a reward to said individual.

To earn your reward, follow the following steps:

- Observe the vehicle: DO NOT MAKE YOUR PRESENCE KNOWN; REPORT THE VEHICLES, NOT THE INDIVIDUALS;
- Record vital information (license plate number, vehicle description, type of material removed, time, date and location of the occurrence);
- File a citizen complaint form with the Sanitation Police;
- Peace Officers, employees of the Department of Sanitation or OATH, employees of any company under contract with the Department of Sanitation, or employees of any government entity that, in conjunction with the Department of Sanitation, conducts enforcement activity relating to illegal dumping, are not eligible for reward.

Please clean in front of your properties and 18 inches into the gutter area of the street. All sweepings must be bagged and disposed of properly. HOPE COUNT 2020

Through #OutreachNYC, thousands of New York City's residents are aiding Dept. of Homeless Service outreach teams' everyday efforts to meet and engage more New Yorkers in need across the five boroughs. DHS needs your help with another vital part of their mission.

On Monday, January 27, 2020, DHS will conduct its Homeless Outreach Population Estimate (HOPE), an annual point-in-time survey of New Yorkers sleeping unsheltered on the streets that is required by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. The HOPE Survey provides valuable information that helps ensure HOME-STAT outreach teams are providing resources to this vulnerable population in their ongoing year-round outreach efforts.

DHS is asking for residents' help to canvass parks, subways, and other public spaces to estimate the number of people who are sleeping on the street on one of the coldest nights of the year. Volunteers are needed from approximately 10:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m. on the night of the 27th. Just one night of your time will help DHS collect critical information to help people move from the streets and into a safe, stable environment.

JOIN YOUR LOCAL NEIGHBORHOOD ORGANIZING CENSUS COMMITTEE

Want to get involved in the 2020 Census right in your own community? Volunteer to become a member of your local Neighborhood Organizing Census Committee (NOCC). Your Neighborhood Organizing Census Committee is a group of volunteers based in a specific neighborhood working to ensure everyone in the community is counted! As a volunteer, you will help NYC Census 2020 with direct local outreach to raise awareness and community organizing to ensure that everybody in your neighborhood gets counted.

NOCCs will help provide an organizational structure for local volunteers to do their own direct outreach to their friends, families, and neighbors, with support from NYC Census 2020. Because all the NOCCs and their volunteers will be rooted in the communities, they will have organic connections to the culture, needs, and resources of the neighborhood. This grassroots effort allows for trust building to better help people understand why the census is so important not just for New York City, but for the local community.

Volunteers will organize teach-ins, phone-banks, and text-banks to get out the count. Each volunteer will choose which team they want to work with and how much responsibility they wish to take on. NHS Brooklyn offers a comprehensive array of services for homeowners, homebuyers, and tenants, including first-time homebuyer education, financial coaching, home repair assistance, home insurance counseling, landlord training, foreclosure intervention, and tenant support services. Most of these services are free to the public.

Labor Services are also being offered at the Assemblywoman's office on Thursdays from 10 AM to 4 PM. Unemployment concerns, training,

job seekers, and compliance appointments can be scheduled. Appointments are necessary.

Assemblywoman Richardson is also pleased to offer a Health Insurance Navigator Program on Mondays from 11 AM to 5 PM. Navigator Programs help to simplify the complicated world of selecting the health insurance plan that is right for you and your family. Individuals can qualify for insurance during this special enrollment period due to loss of health insurance (for reasons other than non-payment of premium), divorce or legal separation, birth or adoption of a child or placement of a child in foster care, and marriage or domestic partnership. Small businesses can apply at any time.


