The overall change year-to-date is **0.73**.

The Department of Sanitation cleanliness rating of our streets, better known as the "scorecard" rating, was **85 for clean streets** and **92.2% for sidewalks** for the month of August.

We continue to urge everyone to adhere to the Dept. of Sanitation's residential enforcement routing times of 8 a.m. to 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. daily. Please clean in front of your

properties and 18 inches into the gutter area of the street. All sweepings must be bagged and disposed of properly. Thank you for your assistance in helping to keep the District clean.

#### **CURBSIDE COMPOSTING**

Curbside Starting October 2, 2023. Composting will be available to ALL Brooklyn residents! Compost will be picked up on your recycling day. DSNY has a limited number of free brown compost collection bins available for residential properties, and Brooklyn residents can now order a Brown Bin through October 13, 2023. To see if you are eligible to complete one. the form order https://www.nyc.gov/assets/dsny/site/conta ct/curbside-composting.

DSNY will pick up ALL leaf and yard waste, food scraps, and food-soiled paper. This includes meat, bones, dairy, prepared foods, and greasy uncoated paper plates and pizza boxes.

Do not compost trash such as diapers, personal hygiene products, animal waste, wrappers, non-paper packaging, and foam products. Also, do not compost recyclable materials.

NOTE: Bulk material should be set out on any collection day that is NOT your compost/recycling day.

You can set out your leaf and yard waste and compost waste in any labeled bin (55 gallons or less) with a secure lid or in your DSNY brown bin, paper lawn and leaf bag, or clear plastic bag. Bundle twigs and branches with twine and place on curb next to bins or bags.

For food scraps and food-soiled paper, make sure to line your bin with a bag to keep it clean, tie the bag closed before putting the bin out for collection, and write your address on your bin. Do not place bags of food waste directly on the curb. You can mix food scraps with leaf and yard waste only when using a bin with a secure lid.

Owners of buildings with 4+ units must provide a storage area and clearly labeled bins for the collection of yard waste.

YOUTH CIVIC ENGAGEMENT ART CONTEST

The New York City Civic Engagement Commission (NYCCEC) Outreach is hosting their first "Youth Who Triumph Through Civic Engagement Art Contest"! They are looking for contestants who can express through art what community involvement looks like and how being civically engaged empowered their success. Eligible entrants must fall into at least one of the following categories: history of foster care; resident of NYCHA/Public housing; Justice Involved/impacted; a student in NYC's alternative District lives schools/programs; in transitional housing/shelter; receive public assistance.

Youth participants must submit an original artwork of any size, using only paint, chalk, color pencils, clay, and/or and spray paint. In addition to their artwork, participants must submit an art narrative between 250 and 500 words that answers the following questions: What does community mean to you? and What ways are you involved with your community?

Two winners from each borough will be selected, one from ages 13 to 17, and one from ages 18 to 23. Each winner will participate in an awards reception, receive \$250, and have their artwork displayed at the Manhattan Borough President's Office.

# RESEARCH FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES FOR COMMUNITY BASED ORGANIZATIONS

Health Research, Inc. (HRI) and the New York State Department of Health (Department), Bureau of Cancer Prevention and Control, is seeking applications (RFA) from organizations to implement community programs to increase screening, colorectal cancer decrease colorectal cancer cases and deaths, and improve health equity in colorectal cancer screening. Priority populations for these activities are individuals who are 45-75 years old and who are Black, Hispanic/Latino, LGBTO+, and/or reside in rural communities, and not up to date with colorectal cancer screening.

Funded organizations must be able to do the following:

- conduct community outreach and deliver education about colorectal cancer risk, prevention, and screening options
- connect persons to community services to address barriers to colorectal cancer screening
- refer persons to culturally competent health care services for colorectal cancer screening

Applicants are not required to have experience or knowledge of cancer screening or prevention. The Department will provide awardees with training, technical assistance, and resources.

HRI/the Department anticipates awarding twelve (12) contracts, for four years and six months (4.5 years), with an expected term of January 1, 2024, to June 30, 2028. Each contract will be valued at \$50,000 for the first four, 12-months periods and \$25,000 for the fifth, six-month period, for a 4.5-year total of \$225,000 for each of the 12 awards.


THE CERT TEAM IS LOOKING FOR VOLUNTEERS!

New York City Community Emergency Response Team (NYC CERT) members are dedicated volunteers who undergo a training program that provides basic response skills needed for fire safety, light search and rescue, community disaster support, disaster medical operations, and traffic control. The volunteer commitment is for at least one year of service following graduation.

NYC CERT members participate in community preparedness and support first responders during disaster response activities, including:

- Traffic and crowd control at the planned and unplanned events.
- Escorting New York City residents of evacuated buildings to retrieve personal belongings.
- Missing person searches.
- Staffing assistance centers and interpreting for New Yorkers affected by emergencies.
- Emergency food and supply distribution during power outages and water main breaks.
- Presenting Ready New York preparedness information to communities and build community disaster networks.

RAINFALL READY NYC: STORM AND HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS

Stormwater is rainwater or melted snow that runs off lawns, streets, and other land surfaces. Ideally, this runoff would be absorbed by plants and soil or make its way down the sewer. But, in New York City, the sidewalks and streets don't absorb rainwater. Instead, the rainwater flows into the city's catch basins, where it's channeled into the sewer system. Unfortunately, the city's catch basins only have so much capacity. Surplus rainwater inevitably flows out into streets and causes local flooding. Sewage can also back up into homes.

On Thursday, **September 28, 2023** from 6 to 8 PM, the NYC Dept. of Environmental Protection (DEP) will conduct a presentation on storm and hurricane preparedness. During the presentation, DEP will provide tips to help homeowners protect their homes from flooding and sewer back-ups during rainfall events. The presentation is to help community members understand the level of risk faced during an intense storm and better protect themselves from stormwater runoff.

DEP will also be giving away rain barrels, sump pumps, flood barriers, flood sensors. The property owners must live in Brooklyn and must attend the presentation on flood preparedness to receive the items (while supplies last).
